From the Deputy's Desk:

Some thoughts:

There are many varied groups of people that children like to become associated with or attached to. It would be good to think that the scouts or guides, the surf life saving association, soccer club, the local music club etc were the order of the day and for many these types of clubs / groups are. However we hear of Emo's and similar cults that have significant 'Gothic' overtones. That these groups present a challenge to society through their actions and are not concerned for the consequences.

In a school environment we are also subject to these factions within the student body and are keen to work with such students when they challenge the norm of everyday life. These students will draw attention to themselves and consequently leave themselves open to comments or actions by other students. Bullying can and does create within these isolated groups a more cohesive group of students who will disassociate themselves even more from the community. They say that 'only the group understands them and that authority has no part to play in their lives'. Whether we like this or not we all have a duty to support these students and to prevent others from 'bullying' them.

I have major concerns for the wellbeing of all students but especially the vulnerable elements of the community.

When we know more and understand their goals we can help.

Please be mindful of what your child watches, what their involvement on the internet is and the influences in their lives.

Whilst we all want a positive life for our children we must tune ourselves into their generation and assist them through their challenges. Have a great weekend.

	Instructions for square wraps: need to measure 10 inches x 10 inches (25cm x 25cm)		

Knitted Squares

To knit a 10 inch x 10 inch square use size 8 (4mm) needles, 8 ply yarn, cast on 50-55 stitches and knit each row plain (ie garter stitch)

Note: Test your tension to measure 10 inches (25cm)

Do not knit: one row plain, one row purl (ie: stocking stitch) as your square will curl up

No knots: Start each ball of yarn at the beginning of a row and sew in ends. Do not cut ends off short, as your

square will unravel. When starting or finishing a square, sew in all ends

Diagonal Squares

Cast on 3 stitches.

Row 1: K1, increase 1 in next stitch, knit to end of row.

Repeat Row 1 until side edge measures 10 inches (25cm)

Next Row: K1, K2 together, knit to end of row. Repeat this row until 3 stitches remain, cast off

The TV program *Root of All Evil* by the Oxford biologist, Richard Dawkins, is an attack on religion which requires a response. Dawkins' TV program is based on his book *The God Delusion*. Unlike his previous books, which were of a scientific genre, we now see Dawkins giving full vent to a personal ideology which ridicules faith in God, particularly the Christian God.

A major weakness with Dawkins is that he seems unable to differentiate between the morality of a hate-filled religious extremist, and the morality of Mother Teresa. He disturbs us with historical accounts of atrocities committed by religious zealots, but fails to analyse whether they were acting in accordance with what even a primary school child would agree to being in line with basic religious teaching. Outrageous religious behaviour is outrageous religious behaviour. Bastardised expressions of Christianity are bastardised expressions of Christianity. Neither represents a true expression of the great religions.

Dawkins often attempts to discredit Christianity by ridiculing the God of the Old Testament. This makes as much sense as theologians ridiculing science on the basis of the teaching of medieval scientists. Dawkins fails to understand that Scriptural understanding, like scientific understanding, is progressive and is built up over time. Scriptural truth according to Christian teaching is fulfilled in the person of Jesus Christ. This is where Dawkins should be spending his time and energy – looking at the "Christ" in Christianity. His failure to do this is a major weakness in his *Root of All Evil*.

Dawkins claims that no rational, scientific person should believe in God. He is wrong. One of the greatest evangelical statements of all time is creation itself. It compels us to consider whether there might be a mind behind the system, a purpose in living or a future after dying.

Most Christians accept the truths within science and see no conflict with there also being a creator God. Christians believe that science answers the questions of "how" and "when" whereas theology answers the questions "who" and "why". Contrary to Dawkins' view, science and faith can exist happily together.

Dawkins suggests that atheists would make better custodians of life on earth. This needs to be challenged. Pol Pot, Hitler and Stalin did not have better ethics than Jesus Christ. Lenin's protracted use of brutality to stamp out Christianity did not enrich his nation. Solzhenitsyn reckoned that since 1923 some 65 million Russians have been killed by their own leaders. Atheism is no innocent unsullied by atrocity. Atheism can be very dark indeed.

The many great reforms introduced into the world by Christians are not recognised by Dawkins. J Wesley Bready in the book *England Before and After Wesley* states that the true spirit and character which has created and sustained free institutions throughout the English speaking world grew out of the oft-lampooned Christian evangelical revival. The work of the "Clapham" sect under William Wilberforce's

leadership led to the abolition of slavery. It also fuelled reforms in the area of animal cruelty, drunkenness, gambling, and took up the political causes of many being oppressed throughout the world. Christians also campaigned on behalf of child workers, lunatics and prisoners. They instituted reforms in several regions of the world. For example, they revolutionalised the economy of Ghana by introducing coffee and cocoa. The orchard industry in Shantung was introduced by Christians. Christians also eradicated malaria, smallpox, and leprosy in places like Northern Thailand, and they resisted "black birding" in the South Pacific.

Dawkins' propensity to judge the validity of Christianity on the basis of un-Christlike behaviour by people claiming to be Christians must also be challenged. He fails to understand that a mouse living in a biscuit tin does not make it a biscuit, despite whatever the mouse might claim. If a person does not act in a Christ-like manner, they are not being Christian.

Special attention is reserved by Dawkins for the practices of the Roman Catholic Church. It must be acknowledged that Dawkins gains some traction in his exposure of some of the more bizarre Christian rituals, practices and beliefs which are not born of that which is central to Biblical teaching. There is perhaps a warning here for all Christian denominations. Whenever Christians have departed from a holistic, balanced understanding of the basic Scriptural principles, they are weakened in their religious integrity.

Dawkins limits himself to representing Christians in a caricature form that does not represent true Christianity. He searches out the weird, the unbalanced, and the extremist and attacks them. This is none other than cheap opportunism. It is easy to make a straw image of your enemies and burn them. Most Christians are not weird, unbalanced or extremist, but their testimony has been edited from Dawkins' program and lies on the cutting room floor.

It is asserted by Dawkins that faith is essentially infantile and something that needs to be rejected along with the Easter Bunny and the Tooth Fairy. Many are not comfortable putting God alongside the Tooth Fairy. Neither are they comfortable with Dawkins' claim that God is but a delusion designed to give hope to the hopeless. Christianity is not just "an opiate for the masses". Indeed, quite the reverse can be argued. The Polish poet, Milousz Czeslaw, who won the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1980, wrote in his essay *The Discreet Charm of Nihilism: "A true opium of the people is a belief in nothingness after death – the huge solace of thinking that for our betrayals, greed, cowardice, and murders we are not going to be judged.*"

Dawkins fails in his duel with God. He even fails in his duel with mankind. Some might find Dawkins useful in the refinement of already established anti-Christian prejudices or might be swayed by his aggressive attack on religion in general. However, most faithful people who live lives based on the central creed of loving God and their neighbour will probably stand firm. They have witnessed too much of God in their own lives to do otherwise.


