Beatitudes



This kid knows when he is on a good thing. She is very happy that mum is willing to exert all the effort to get them to their destiny. Oh the benefits of a free ride. The Beatitudes are a very interesting read and speak in opposite terms to what we are used to hearing. ¹³**"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven"** (Matthew 5:3).

The very first beatitude tells us that to be rich (receive the kingdom of heaven) you need to be poor. Not too many people are out there saying, be poor and get rich. Yet Jesus is helping people understand how they can get into heaven, and the way in, says Jesus, is to

be poor in spirit.

What does poor in spirit mean?

If you look at poverty stricken people they have nothing to offer in terms of self-provision. They cannot supply what they need for themselves, and in much the same way Jesus is telling those around Him, and all future generations, indeed all peoples regardless of economic position and cultural background, to be like that, poor in spirit. To be poor in spirit is to abandon one's pride, stubbornness and anything else that prevents someone from relying on God's provision for the eternal life, found only in the Lord Jesus Christ. To be poor in spirit is to see your own inability to discover, and to get into, God's kingdom on your own terms.

The message of Jesus does sound like the exact opposite of the daily encouragement we often receive. People are regularly told things like: "God helps those who help themselves" or "You have to work hard to achieve." While both are true, God does not encourage laziness, and people who don't work, often don't achieve; but when it comes to getting into God's paradise, the only way in is to be a beggar, poor in spirit, asking Jesus to freely give what is needed. Happy are those who have the humility to say to Jesus, I need you to get me in God's kingdom. Oh the benefits of a free ride.

From the Head of the Junior School: Mr. Rick Harrison

Despite the appalling weather, the Primary Swimming Carnival was able to go ahead with all of the scheduled events completed. It is a measure of the dedication of our students, parents and staff that the carnival did proceed relatively smoothly. Many thanks go to the students who swam and supported, the parents, the staff and in particular, Mr Walker for his preparation of the event.

There are a few boys in the Junior School who are wearing their hair in a manner that is not appropriate. This may be that it is too long or the style is of an "untidy" kind. Despite the attractions (to students) of current trends, the College has restrictions regarding hair. It is very difficult to be completely prescriptive when defining what is and what is not allowed, as it is impossible to predict trends in hair styles. However, we do reserve the right to judge whether a particular hair style is suited to school. Some students will receive uniform violation letters if it is felt that their hair is inappropriate.

From next week students who are involved in after school activities and who attend (or their siblings attend) After School Care will be charged \$2 for the period up to 4:00pm. Students who are not collected immediately after the conclusion of an after school activity and are therefore sent to After School Care will be charged at the normal rate.

While on the topic of After School Care, it has come to my attention that some students are being instructed by their parents not to go to After School Care even if they have not been collected by 3:30pm. This means that some children are hiding around the school or arguing with staff when told to go to After School Care. I would like to remind parents that it is a policy of the College that all Junior School students uncollected by 3:30pm must go to After School Care and that a fee is then charged. Giving such contradictory instructions to your children not only puts them under unnecessary stress, but could also place them in physical danger.

Senior School Peer Tutor and Reader Scribe Program

In 2004 a Peer Tutor and Reader/Scribe Program was begun to pair students in need of various forms of assistance with a student who is willing and able to help. Recognition of this service appears in school reports and a yearly certificate is awarded to participants. It also counts as an activity as part of the compulsory participation in the extra-curricular life of the College. It is a rewarding and worthwhile act of service.

If you participated in the program last year, you will automatically be invited to participate again this year. The first meeting was held on Friday. A training session/ refresher course will be run in the next fortnight. It is compulsory for all new peer tutors. Regular meetings will be held, at least once a term, which you must attend. These are advertised in the Daily Bulletin. In addition, Fridays at homeroom time, Mrs. Allen can be found in D block to confidentially discuss any difficulties with which peer tutors may need help.

If you are a **new student** to Arndell, including all **Year Seven** students, volunteer your name to Mrs. Allen or Mr. Kirkwood if you are interested in participating. Information will then be sent home to the parents of identified students in order to obtain permission for you to participate. In class peer tutors do not miss any class-work or time. Reader/Scribes are out of class only a handful of times each year.

News from our Library Centres: Mrs Connie Stephens - Head of Library Services

The *Junior Library Centre* will be holding its annual Scholastic Book Fair commencing next Friday, March 14 and finishing on Wednesday, March 19.. The school receives a 30% return on the sales, so it is a great way for you to support the library and provide great books for your kids. Purchases may be made before school, at lunchtime or after school until 4pm. Further information from Mrs Miller in our next Advocate.

The *Senior Library Centre* is open for student study from 8:00 – 4:30pm Tuesday-Friday & until 4:pm on Mondays. Parents are welcome at anytime to browse through our resources. The library has a photocopier for use by the student and parent community. (20c/page). We also have a parent borrower's bookshelf in the foyer with 200 books. Please bring the books to the library circulation desk for borrowing. Below is a short review of just a few of these.

- *Starting School* by Sue Berne, looks at the key issues in starting school. It can be used to assess your child's readiness for school or to develop skills needed for a happy adjustment to school life. Issues addressed include helping your child become independent, developing friendship skills, keeping safe, how to 'bullyproof' your child and how to deal with the 'highs and lows' of the first year. This book also looks at the important issue of happiness in children.
- *Praising Boys* and *Praising Girls* (two separate books) by Elizabeth Hartley-Brewer. These books are (separate) tips for parents and teachers about taking advantage of opportunities for effective praise in everyday situations. You will discover how to tailor praise to age and development level, why it is important to be truthful and descriptive with praise, when incentives are appropriate and when they are not and which language phrases work best and which ones to avoid. Sounds like we could all benefit from this one.
- *Don't Just Stand There- Parents Take Action* by Dorothy Lenthall, is a guide to assist parents who are faced with the task of asking the school for help for their bullied child. It contains steps parents can use to help in the process of protecting their child as well as hints on getting into a helpful 'mindset' before approaching the school.
- *Boy Oh Boy* by Dr Tim Hawkes, (Head of The King's School at Parramatta) writes about his passion of helping boys to reach their full potential. He looks at the issues of boys' behaviour at school, aggression and bullying, optimizing scholastic performance, getting boys to read more, friendship and sex, becoming socially responsible and improving relations with parents.

There are many helpful books for parents in this bookshelf. It's worth your look.

From the Youth Liaison Officer: Windsor Police Station

Bicycles/Scooters/motorised mini bikes and scooters. All riders of bicycles must wear a helmet with the appropriate Australian Standards safety standard sticker attached. Fine \$53. Anyone who rides a scooter/skateboard or roller blades should wear a helmet and protective gear. The following vehicles (irrespective of the power output of the motor) are banned from use on roads or in public areas.

1. Motorised foot scooters (with or without a seat) - electric/petrol engine
 2. Mini-bikes
 3. Motorised Human transporters such as the WheelMan, or SEGWAY
 4. Motorised skateboards - electric/petrol engines
- POLICE CAN SEIZE AND TAKE POSSESSION OF UNREGISTERED VEHICLES (including prohibited vehicles).

If any of the above prohibited vehicles are used on a road or in a public place the following fines may apply:

Use Unregistered Vehicle \$477
Use Uninsured Vehicle \$477
Not pay road tax \$477
Total fine: \$1,431.

CAREER EXPLORATION FOR YEAR 10

Arndell Anglican College has organised for the Company Robert Allwell and Associates to conduct a Career Exploration Program for all Year 10 students.

The program is designed to:

- * assess educational skills and career interests.
- * educate students about decision making and career planning.
- * develop research skills to enable them to make considered career choices.
- * assist students to make realistic subject selections for Years 11 and 12.

To complete the program, there will first of all be a morning of assessment organised by Robert Allwell and Associates on **Wednesday 12 March**. This will include written tests in Maths and Language aptitude and achievement and work and lifestyle preferences. Students do not study for these tests. They are each required to bring a **black or blue pen, calculator and water**.

These tests will be assessed by the company and the results sent to Arndell. Meanwhile, there will be a program of lessons taken by the Careers Adviser and other staff explaining what the results mean, returning the results and assisting students in their research of careers.
