From The Headmaster:

Dr. John Goddard

A belated welcome to Term 2 to everyone from me! It is very good to be back in school; at the same time, it was a marvellous privilege to have a time of study leave, to be able to able to travel and to visit a wide range of overseas schools, to read and to think about issues in education. What I saw and heard was very stimulating; sometimes it made me smile almost with relief (boys attempt to untuck their shirts in every country and we all chip away at them!); sometimes it set me a challenge (for example, to enthuse all students and parents about the merits of participating in co-curricular activies); and often it made me realise, as I'm sure you realise, that so much of what we are doing at Arndell constitutes a very fine provision of education indeed. We should all thank God for that!

An absence, however brief, always creates work for others to pick up, and I want to thank particularly Mr. Webb for acting in my stead in recent weeks and those many senior members of staff who have picked up extra tasks. I value enormously the support shown by all our staff as they make things happen!

During this week, the NAPLAN tests took place for students in Years 3,5,7 and 9. These tests replaced the old Basic Skills/Ella/Snap tests and added Year 9 to the national testing program. From our point of view, students managed the tests very well; I would be interested to hear from parents any comments you might make about the impact of such testing. We have to do it, as a clear condition of government funding, and I support the tests, as useful diagnostic instruments. The results of such a huge, nation-wide enterprise will probably not come through for some weeks.

My thanks to parents who participated in the "Stage 1 on Display" morning on Wednesday of this week. This new initiative was designed so that parents and prospective parents might see the classes in Years K, 1 and 2 in action and talk to staff about the kinds of activites that occur. It gave parents a clear idea of what, for example, a youngster in Kindy next year might experience. I express my great thanks to Mrs Misztal and the staff of Stage One, to Mr Harrison, Mr McKenzie and to Mrs Whelan and the Admin Staff for their hard work in mounting this event.

Thank you also to staff and parents for their participation in this Year's 12 Parent/Teacher evening this week. Most Year 12 students are preparing themselves very well for the HSC; some have an enormous way to go if they are to feel any real sense of satisfaction at the end of the year. The evening was a positive and valuable exchange of information and discussion of the implications of results so far.

Last week saw a large squad of runners go to Hills Zone Cross Country at Redfield. The girls and boys ran very well, and Mrs. Cornick will publish more detail of the results. I do want to congratulate Alex Celio (Year 8), who won his event in splendid style and so ranks No. 1 in the Zone as he moves on to higher representative levels. Well done to Alex, and to all the runners who represented us so ably. As I indicated above, my recent weeks away fill me with a sense of thankfulness, for opportunities provided to me and for the achievement s of our fine school. I did see other schools (though not many) where the message of Christ is presented clearly and with vigour. This is something we do, from Kindy on, and it is easy to lose sight of how special and important that is. In the midst of education and activities – on all of which I place high value – let us never forget the higher value to be found in sharing our love of Christ with students, parents and the whole school community.

Life, Work and Excitement

This week I had the chance to catch up with a good friend, Robyn, who has been involved in translating the Bible into Ramoaaina, for the Duke of York Islanders of Papua New Guinea, for the last 19 years. Her visit has reminded me of two things:

- 1. How it is so easy to take for granted the literacy skills the average Australian has and the importance of having these skills to function in society.
- 2. That it is easy to dream small or to underestimate what God can do through ordinary people.

The points have risen in my mind because of some personal testimonies in a couple of short DVDs Robyn showed in a few of my classes. When people heard the stories of Jesus in their own language they got really excited because it was like receiving direct communication rather than communication through a third person. I am always humbled by things that start in a small way and end up being something big. I think of Jesus, who started Christianity, a single man (yes He was the divine Son of God



who took on flesh but nevertheless was still restricted by flesh) who built strong ties with 12 others, and in His strength the 11 (remember Judas betrayed Jesus) upturned the world!

Too many people live for themselves, for this world only, and that my friends is what I call a small dream. Too many of us forget that a person in God's hands will have a greater adventure because the living God knows the depth of who we are better than we know ourselves. To dream without the Lord Jesus' involvement is too limiting because He alone knows the world completely, with all its differences, and needs. He alone knows the very depths of our abilities and capability. He alone is in the position to see the whole picture, the beginning and the end, and so is able to match the right time and place for us to use our given abilities to work, and to experience the **FULL** life he intended for us to live.

I am so proud of the students who are going to the Northern Territory because they are willing to let Christ take them to places that are in many ways unknown to them and the students see this as something very exciting, as do I.

I encourage you to think on these words from Psalm 37: "Delight yourself in the LORD and he will give you the desires of your heart." Note that we are to delight in the Lord first (as you live daily delight in him), then you will truly find your heart's desire, and live a life of lasting satisfaction.

We run this fund raising event each year to support our World Vision children. This year we have raised around \$1200.

Library Databases: A reminder to all parents that the library subscribes to several subject specific databases, which are on our library catalogue. The library catalogue is accessible through the student portal on our website. Whilst our general library catalogue is available for the public to view, these databases are only available to Arndell students. This is why students need to login through the student portal and then again in the top right hand corner on the Arndell Collaborix page to view the passwords for the databases.

Some of these databases are accessible there (under heading *Links* on RHS of screen) without a password, but others require a specific password, listed under the heading 'Database Passwords' on this page. You should find researching on these databases easier than searching through the thousands of sites that search engines generally offer. We have subscribed to help in that way. Annual subscriptions cost us about \$8 000, so I need to be confident that they are being utilized to justify their continuance.

On this page students will also find a link for *Preparing Bibliographies* for school assignments. This twelve page document has clear instructions on how to write up a bibliography for all types of sources used. This document should be printed off and referred to each time a bibliography is prepared.


Two from two in the Hills Cup: Mr. Steven Burroughs

LEAP Students win gold in Academic Pentathlon:

Senior LEAP students recently competed in the first Arndell Academic Pentathlon where two teams from each year group 7-10 competed in a range of activities across different academic areas. Teams designed and built weight-bearing towers in the Science & Engineering section, and played word games and a spelling bee in the English component. In the Performing Arts section students created and performed a TV commercial for a novelty product, while in the Art and Poetry section teams had to submit a piece of artwork and

complementary piece of poetry on the theme of 'relaxation'. Finally teams squared off in a trivia challenge covering areas like mathematics, world flags, Australian, world history, famous faces, geography, and sport. In a close battle teams displayed high operational skills and team work to achieve the objective of each activity. Answers in the trivia showcased students' wide knowledge and gave opportunities for creativity and initiative. Despite teams from each year group achieving high scores in the end there could only be one





winner. The activities were aimed to give students from each year group equal opportunities and scores from each team were combined to determine the 'smartest year group at Arndell'. The results were: 4th place – Year 7, 3rd place – Year 9, 2nd place – Year 10, 1st place – Year 8. Interestingly enough, both Year 8 teams out-performed the other teams, demonstrating they really are in a 'league of their own'.

(cont'd) (Term 2, Week 3)

Disaccharides: These contain two units of saccharides and hence the name!

Sucrose (cane sugar/household sugar): Sucrose is broken down into the two monosaccharide's, glucose and fructose in the intestines which are then absorbed. High sucrose intake tends to damage the liver which is attributed to the fructose derived from sucrose. Sucrose is the main cause of tooth decay, although all mono and disaccharides may share the blame.

Maltose (malt sugar): It is the intermediate product formed in the breakdown of starch into glucose.

Lactose (milk sugar): This sugar is the sugar of human and animal milk. It is easily digestible and is not as sweet as cane sugar. Lactose is broken down by the enzyme lactase into glucose and galactose.


