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From The Headmaster: Dr John Goddard

Some of the conversations I have had with students this week seem to have had a common thread - the great benefits we derive from being positive and finding the best, the most promising elements in all that we do. We all know that negativity drags us all down – but resolving to work at being positive and forward looking actually demands effort. Or perhaps it is only at an adult age that it demands effort, for so many of our Arndell students are instinctively and gloriously positive!

For example:

Three Year 4 B students wrote letters to me this week, telling me about their families, their pets (which are obviously part of the family) and their hobbies. The letters sparkled with the joy of being nine. Well done Rosie, Ellie and Emily, and may we all hang on to such sparkle.

A polite and self-effacing Elizabeth Koob told me of her exploits in the Elysian International Horse Show in Queensland at the start of this term. To be in two finals, and to come 11th out of 191, and 16th out of 163, against much older company, is an enormous achievement. When such excellent spirit is displayed in such an unassuming fashion, we can all be positive.

Four or five seconds of film! - it might not sound like much, but it represented hours of painstaking work for the Year 7 Integrated Studies students and Mr Lumb. I loved the mini - claymation films; but even more I loved the positive re-enforcement that each group gave the others as they shared their wares.

This list could go on and on: Junior School Lego-Robotics students Hannah and Daniel earning a place in the national finals because of their skills and efforts; Year 11 students of Geography really determined that an excursion to the Barrier Reef and surrounding country is important for them and that they will work to make it happen; and students in leadership, sport, Duke of Edinburgh's Award, indeed, in every facet of a busy school's life.

Can we adults all be part of this positiveness? We can, and in fact we should be leading the way in it. We can see, from our more experienced vantage point, how energetic engagement leads to satisfying and marvellous results. We might have lost the innocence - but we still experience the joy when something works and we still love to share with our young people as they experience and build on that joy. And though we are often more aware of obstacles, we may have learnt to find a positive thrill in a challenge and a spirit of thankfulness for the countless blessings we do enjoy.

From the Deputy's Desk: Mr J Webb

Yes I still work here!!! It has been so busy this term but what concerns me more is the wave of illness that has hit the College. Staff, students and parents alike. It is upon this point that I would like to dwell. Student services receive an enormous number of casualties from all years in the course of the day. They range from cuts and bruises to the odd broken bone and sometimes worse. What distresses us is that more often now we are sending students home who should never have come in to College in the first place. On a dozen or so occasions we have had students come to us almost as the day starts with high temperatures and nausea. Parents it is the Administration Staff who look after your children. They spend time phoning home in an attempt to get the children back to where they should have been in the first instance – in bed. A figure to ponder. Since the commencement of the term – 4 weeks – we have sent home 103 students: need I say any more?

Year 12 Trials:

As I write this message for the Advocate we are well into the trials period. The students have approached the exams with some trepidation however I expect them to take on board Dr. Goddard's comment that 'This is a springboard into the HSC proper. On completion it is not a point to 'take a break, but to forge on towards better marks".

Staff Illness and Cover

It is crucial that parents are aware that we have had a great deal of staff illness and that the rest of the staff have rallied around enormously to step into specialist areas in years 10, 11 and 12 to ensure that at this vital time of the year students are not disadvantaged in any way. We all thank them for this help. I have even had the opportunity to work with the year 12 Biology students – the excitement of being back in a classroom - awesome.

'Student Alert'

This is a note primarily for parents.

The Headmaster has addressed Heads of House and Heads of Department on the topic of 'early communication'. It will work like this:

- an ongoing issue arises with a student often the minor happenings are dealt with and all resolved within minutes.
 The ongoing issue seems not to be able to be resolved;
- at the above point the 'executive' are notified that a problem has arisen;
- a member of the executive or the Head of Department or Head of House will contact home.

We will simply say 'A problem has occurred, that the staff member and the Head of Department are working towards a resolution and that this is to 'Alert You' to the concern. More details will follow should there be a need. We are all then working towards a resolution. You the parent are informed early and can assist in discussing matters with your child. Some students are slipping under the radar and we do not wish things to escalate without parents receiving ample notification. I will address this matter at the next P and F meeting.

Uniform and Make-Up

With the present system in place a significant number of girls have had make-up removed, nail polish removed and a variety of jewellery also removed. Where the boys are concerned a large number of boys are sporting tidier hair and some even cleaner shoes. I am distressed at times though when a student is challenged and responds with 'my hair is staying like this because Mum said so'. I have a problem with that, as you would imagine. Parents would expect to receive a phone call and a meeting arranged. A lot of this is a huge waste of time. The College regulations were put in place in 1990; they are simple to make life simple. The battles we face over these issues I am at a loss to explain. I would rather be dealing with the excitement of a classroom or watching a student's first science experiment go off with a bang or cheer on the last place runner in a race than have to spend so much time dealing with uniform or make-up issues that should never have left the house. I despair when, in a Parents and Friends meeting, this topic is brought up. I see us working together to ensure that the College uniform is worn with pride and that the College regulations, signed by parents, are adhered to.

Wow!!!!! That was huge but certainly needed to be said.

Let us advance the education of our children, enable them to become valued members of the community and assist them to understand that there will always be quidelines and rules to follow.

The Story Of Wild Geese: from the Senior School Assembly last week

In the fall when you see Geese heading south for the winter flying along in the "V" formation, you might be interested in knowing what science has discovered about why they fly that way. It has been learned that as each bird creates uplift for the bird immediately following. By flying in a "V" formation, the whole flock greater flying range than if each bird flew on its own. The Geese honk from behind to encourage those up front to keep their speed Words of support and inspiration help energize those on the front line, helping them to keep pace in spite of the day-to-day pressures and fatigue. It is important that our honking be encouraging. Otherwise it's just - well honking! Finally, when a Goose gets sick or is wounded by a gunshot and falls out, two Geese fall out of the formation and follow the injured one down to help and protect him. They stay with him until he is either able to fly or until he is dead, and then they launch out with another formation to catch up with their group. When one of us is down, it's up to the others to stand by us in our time of trouble. If we have the sense of a Goose, we will stand by each other when things get rough. We will stay in formation with those headed where we want to go. Remember their message that:

"It Is Indeed A Reward, A Challenge And A Privilege To Be A Contributing Member Of A Team"


