## From The Headmaster: Dr John Goddard

We have all been very impressed by the superb efforts of our swimmers in recent times, and never more so than at the AICES carnival on Monday of this week. You will read more details of the results elsewhere; but it is very important that we congratulate **Tahnie Jackson** of Year 12, the champion in her age-group and holder of no fewer than **3** new AICES records: a magnificent achievement! Congratulations to all those who swam at this representative level, and to those going on to CIS we wish good swimming and happy waves!

Parents will note later in this newsletter two notices about adult literacy/numeracy which I commend to your attention. They are placed in this newsletter in support of Richmond TAFE, who each year programs to support adults in language, literacy and numeracy. You might draw the notices to the attention of those to whom they are relevant; or, if you would like to be a volunteer in this valuable community work, take note of the contact details in this announcement.

I also draw to parents' attention our need of a suitable Presiding Officer for the HSC and School Certificate exams in October/November of this year. The appointee will actually be appointed and paid by the NSW Board of Studies, but we need to nominate an appropriate person. Please note:

- the Presiding Officer must not have a child or close relative in Year 10 or 12 this year.
- he/she needs good, thorough, careful organizational skills.
- he/she will have to pass Child Protection Screening.
- the work is on full days or half days (depending on the exam timetable) for about 4 weeks.

Please get in touch with me or with Mrs Dean (Director of Studies) if you are interested; or, if you know a suitable person, point them in our direction.

Speaking of exams, I have been very impressed by the way in which our Year 12 Students have approached their mid-year exams this week. They have worked solidly through a packed schedule. The exams are both vital Assessment tasks **and** vital learning experiences: they show us what we know and how much more we need to know. For the forthcoming holidays, and for the first two weeks of Term 2, I shall be undertaking a period of study leave, doing some reading and visiting various schools, looking at the two topics - Co-education: Why is it the best way?, and Worship occasions - how do different schools see them In my absence, Mr Webb will be Acting Headmaster. The school could not be in better hands! Our Lord's post-resurrection appearances to his followers provide some of the most arresting and remarkable stories about him. Can you actually imagine seeing the nail marks, let alone putting your hand on his pierced side? At this time just after Easter, I pray that, whatever our human doubts, we can come to the same acknowledgement as poor old Thomas (see John 20:28), "My Lord and my God!"

## From the Deputy's Desk: Mr James Webb

## Almost at the end of Term 1 – I can't believe I am saying that!

I have been impressed with the number of activities and the level of participation of the students. This term we will have had 2 of our major carnivals - swimming and at the end of the term cross country. Our students have been heavily involved in the Hills Zone competitions and representative sport. They have also been preparing for our major Drama production with auditions and rehearsals. The dance students have also been rehearsing not only for their part in the drama production but also their dance extravaganza later in the year. The choir has been preparing for their overseas tour to the UK, the World's Greatest Shave has happened and funds raised, and the various bands have been rehearsing and playing. These few activities are the tip of a very large iceberg.

My enormous thanks to the staff who have given up so many hours to make these things happen and my equally enormous thanks to the students who have committed their time to represent the College.

#### Discipline at the College:

I prefer the term Non Compliance when we talk about this issue. Generally problems in classrooms occur through students not complying with College or Classroom quidelines.

Our process is as follows:

- Subject Teacher tries to work through the issue discussion re appropriate behaviour. Depending on the nature of 1. the incident the Subject Teacher or the Head of Department may give a courtesy call home to say that a problem has arisen - all ok we are working through the problem but just be aware - We call it a 'Head's Up'
- 2. The Subject Teacher may issue lunch detentions within the department. Hopefully we have a positive outcome. If not:
- 3. The Head of Department is asked to be involved – the student may be placed on a monitoring sheet. Referral sent to the Head of House. At that point the parents may be notified, as is the Homeroom Tutor and I am also kept in the loop. Discussions take place and hopefully a resolution is found. If not:
- The Head of House in collaboration with me discuss placing the student on a Level Zero Folder. This monitors 4. behaviour, work etc across all subjects. Parents are informed and the student reports to me 4 times a day to discuss progress. After a week we review the Level Folder and discuss options. If a resolution occurs - awesome but if not!
- Upgrade of the Level Folder we have 4 Levels with either internal or external suspension and a case conference 5. occurs. A variety of supports are put in place to assist the student in changing their behaviour. If no resolution we move through the Levels with modified folders to attack certain behaviours.
- 6. If all else fails it may be that the Headmaster recommends to the College Chairman that the student be removed from the College. However we hope to have resolved the issues, with parent help long before this action is taken.
- In all that we do we can only work with a student if you the parents are prepared to work with us. If there is a problem 7. we need you to acknowledge this; the child you see at home may not be the one who sits in class and disrupts the learning of others.
- I am a little irritated when parents say "Oh it's the teacher who can't control the class". Where in all this does the 8. responsibility of the student lie?
- 9. Let us all work together to make the classroom a great place to be for all students.

#### Reminder:

Parents we have a College uniform – it is part of the requirements that this is worn correctly. Over the past 6 weeks we have had some 200 incidents of students failing to arrive at the College correctly dressed – necessitating lunch detentions being issued. This means that it is your responsibility. Please help us to reduce these numbers by ensuring that your child leaves home in the morning correctly dressed.

The College hat is a part of the uniform. Students have lockers where these can be placed during the day. I am afraid that some of the girls' hats are a disgrace and do nothing to support the image that the College is trying to portray.

Uniform, manners, class work, attitude and success all work together - what is it that you want from your child's College? and what is it

that you want from your child?

Having said all of that the vast majority of students simply get on with life and really work towards positive goals.
