



The Book:

'A Land of Plenty' tells the stories of two fictional families, the Prestons, and the Crothers, in nineteenth century England and Australia.

There are twelve separate but interwoven stories. All are historical as they take place against a background of particular events, but are fictional in that the characters and their stories are invented.

John William Prestons comes to Sydney with Governor Macquarie's 73rd Regiment. He and his children contribute to, and benefit from, the growth of New South Wales. Gold discoveries, bushrangers, pastoral wealth, and paddle steamers are part of their ivies.

William Crothers born into a Liverpool merchant family becomes a clergyman who serves in Sydney, and the 'out back'. He returns to England to establish an orphanage with money provided by the Prestons family.

The later stories, told by descendants of the Crothers family, tell of the search for the gold hidden by John William Prestons on his property north of Bathurst.
